

Seminar Highlights Importance of ICT to Rural Areas

The importance of Information Communications Technology (ICT) to the development of rural areas in Europe was the focus of an ENRD seminar held in Brussels, on 10 February, 2011.

The event entitled ICT and rural areas: building the knowledge society at grassroots level provided a useful platform for discussing the implementation of ICT policies in rural areas and how this has been implemented in different Member States.

The seminar, which was attended by around 140 ICT and rural development stakeholders, examined the role of rural development policy concerning broadband infrastructure. In general, the seminar underlined the importance of ICT as a cornerstone for the development of rural areas.

Speaking at the event, John Hannafin, from the Tipperary Institute in Ireland said it "truly demonstrated the breadth and diversity of projects already supported by the EAFRD'. However, it was noted that there is a real need for more investment in ICT infrastructure in rural areas and for greater incentives for the rural population to use new technologies.

Mid-term Evaluation Report Results on NRNs

The mid-term evaluations of Rural Development Programmes (RDPs) were finalised in each EU Member State by 31 December, 2010 and are currently under examination by the Managing Authorities and the Commission's services. These external evaluations examine the degree of utilisation of resources and the effectiveness and efficiency of the RDPs. They will also provide valuable insight into the perceived effectiveness of the National Rural Networks (NRNs). The ENRO Contact Point will compile a report on this, to be presented at the next NRN meeting in Germany on 27 April, 2011.

Polish and Portuguese LAGs Sign 'Cooperation Declaration' at Seminar

A cooperation seminar involving Local Action Groups (LAGs) from Portugal and Poland was held on February 11, in the Portuguese district of Santasem. In total, 24 representatives (from two Polish and six Portuguese LAGs) met to discuss joint organisation of various actions: cooperation projects to support economic development and local entrepreneurship; expanding marketing opportunities for local products; and promoting rural tourism. After the seminar a 'signature ceremony' was held, where participants signed a declaration of cooperation between the two countries. Click have.



Slovenia is a relatively small European country with a unique natural heritage, characterised by relief diversity, rich nature systems and rich forests. The Natura 2000 areas cover more than 35 percent and forests almost 60 percent of the entire Slovenian territory, giving Slovenia one of the largest shares of protected and forested areas in Europe, Ingeneral, Sloventa is gutta sparsely populated. Low productivity remains the key problem for the agriculture sector in rural areas; the food processing industry and the forestry sector also play an important role in the economy. However, generally all three sectors are facing restructuring processes and there is strong potential for the growth of organic production, as well as the establishing of local markets in Slovenia. Rural areas have an aging population with young people leaving to find opportunities elsewhere. wever, those rural areas that are close to urban centres are experiencing population increases. The environment is well preserved and has a favourable species and habitat status, supported by a sound infrastructure for sustainable farming and forest management. Background:

The project was developed to help address the imbalance that exists in Estonia whereby both the production and consumption of organic food is increasing, but the processing and marketing of local organic products remains under-developed.

Objective:

To respond to the increasing demand for organic food products in Estonia by improving the marketing of organic foods that have been produced and processed in Estonia.

Main Activities:

Alt-Lauri Farm Shop and the South Estonia Food Network have developed an effective direct-marketing network for a range of local farm products, including organic food. The South Estonia Food Network started to market organic products in 2006, but needed further supplies of good quality products to expand their activities. The Food Network provides healthy organic food products to regional children's nurseries and schools. Customers can place their orders by email and goods are delivered directly to their home.

Results and Benefits:

Investment in facilities for improving the processing and marketing of local organic food products at Alt-Lauri Farm has resulted in:
